## **Formatting Titles**

## Capitalization

In titles of books, magazines, poems, stories, movies, paintings and other works of art, *capitalize the first and last words, as well as other "important" words*.

 In the middle of titles, <u>do not capitalize articles</u> (a, an, the), <u>conjunctions</u> (and, but, or, nor), or prepositions of four or fewer letters (of, with, for, from, in, etc.)

## Italics

Titles of "full works" are italicized. Full works include **books**, movies, magazines, newspapers, and record albums.

**Books**: <u>L</u>ord of the <u>F</u>lies / <u>E</u>nder's <u>G</u>ame / <u>H</u>arry <u>P</u>otter and the <u>S</u>orcerer's <u>S</u>tone

Movies: <u>The Matrix / Saving Private Ryan / A Series of Unfortunate Events</u>

Magazines: <u>F</u>ood <u>N</u>etwork <u>M</u>agazine / <u>N</u>ational <u>G</u>eographic / <u>S</u>ky & <u>T</u>elescope

**Newspapers**: <u>The New York Times / The Washington Post / The Cleveland Plain Dealer</u>

**Record albums**: ...<u>A</u>nd <u>O</u>ut <u>C</u>ome the <u>W</u>olves / <u>M</u>ellon <u>C</u>ollie and the <u>Infinite</u> <u>S</u>adness

## **Quotation marks**

Titles of "smaller works" that are part of a larger whole are indicated with quotation marks. Works within works would be things like **short stories** within a larger volume, **songs from an album**, **poems** that come from a collection, and **articles found in magazines or on websites**.

Short stories: "<u>A</u>ll <u>Summer in a Day</u>" / "<u>There Will Come Soft Rains</u>" / "<u>The Veldt</u>"

Songs: "Here Comes the Sun" / "Stairway to Heaven" / "My Generation"

Poems: "Walking Across the Atlantic" / "Stupid Pencil Maker" / "Theme for English B"

Articles: "Consider the Lobster" / "Hub Fans Bid Kid Adieu" / "The Curious Case of Sidd Finch"
