Text to Film ---> Film to Text

<u>Procedure</u>: After watching the clips from *Jaws* and *The Matrix*, you need to do what Peter Benchley did, but in reverse order. Write five simple core sentences that go along with the opening scene from *The Matrix*. Try to capture the basic image by using specific words. Be sure to use sensory details, or words that deal with all five senses, when you create these sentences.

Example:

<u>Core Sentence #1</u>: Trinity sprinted across the rooftop.

(notice sprinted rather than ran.)

Now, add a revision technique, to give the sentence a fuller image.

Sentence #1 Revised:

Trinity, <u>fearful</u> that the Agent would catch her, sprinted across the rooftop.

(Adjectives out of order)

HERE IS THE HARD PART! **Evaluate** your sentence! My first effort is good, but it is not great. You need to be able to say that about *your* writing if you ever hope to improve it. I decided to switch the revision technique.

Sentence #1, 2nd Revision: <u>Heels hammering</u> the slick tin rooftop like hammer blows, Trinity sprinted across the rooftop.

(absolute – heels hammering)

Look at the effort again. I like this one a lot better, but it still needs another tweak. Did you notice that I used the word *rooftop* twice and the word *hammer* twice in the same sentence? It sounds a little awkward, a little repetitive in a bad way. To make it better, I need to change the repeated words. Changing "hammer" is done easily enough, but what else can I call the rooftop? I mean, it *is* a rooftop! So I went back in for another crack at it:

Sentence #1, 3rd Revision: <u>Heels pounding</u> the slick tin like hammer blows, Trinity sprinted across the rooftop.

And I am done! All I did to revise the sentence was to remove the first rooftop. Style-wise, I kind of like the mystery about the tin in the revision technique. The reader may be unsure what tin I am talking about at first, but the "rooftop" in the core sentence tells him/her that the rooftop is made of tin.

All of this revising took fewer than 3 minutes. *Revising is not proofreading for errors!* Revising is changing the <u>content</u> of your writing. Without revision, you will be left with crusty mustard for the rest of your life, and no one wants that. :-P
